

In October a group of Cookstown GCSE and A-Level pupils went on a Shared Education trip to Stephen Farnan's pottery workshop in Belfast. It was an invaluable experience for the pupils were Stephen talked about his work, how to set up a business and demonstrated some of the ceramic techniques he uses. The pupils then got the opportunity to visit one of Farnan's shops and do a decal print onto clay.

There were three winners in the local Credit Union art competition. They were Jasmine Glendinning, Jamie Ferguson and William Graham. They all progressed to the National Level.

In early November there was another Shared Education trip with Holy Trinity college to the RUA exhibition in the Ulster Museum. This year past pupil Mollie Brown was selected to showcase her installation art work. This is a wonderful achievement as there is a rigorous selection process by the RUA panel to select work to be exhibited in this exhibition. Lucky for our pupils Mollie was there to give them a talk about her art work.

Later in November year 11 pupils visited the Tyrone Crystal factory in Dungannon. This was another Shared Education and a lottery funded





event. Pupils were given a talk on the history of Tyrone Crystal and then got the chance to do some glass engraving. They all completed a finished piece of crystal.

In December Cookstown High School and Holy Trinity College Shared Education Art Exhibition was in the Burnavon Arts Centre. On display in the upper gallery was a selection of GCSE and A-Level pupil's work. This was a great occasion to showcase the work of pupils from both schools to the community. Pupils in Year 8, 9 and 10 completed a number of different projects this school year 8. Year 8 completed a colour theory still-life project and ceramic fish project. Year 9 worked on a portrait project and creative industries project where they made a Toby Jug and year 10 did a figurative project were some pupils made a figurative sculpture. Lots of highly skilful and creative work was created.

Junior LSC pupils worked very hard as well and in particular made lovely ceramic pumpkins



for Hallowe'en and weaved a dream catcher in the spring term.

Biology

Year 13 A-Level Biologists Explore Umbra Nature Reserve

On Wednesday, 20th March, Year 13 A-level Biology students embarked on a field trip to the Umbra Nature Reserve to study its unique sand dune ecosystem. This handson experience allowed students to apply their theoretical knowledge in a real-world setting, enhancing their understanding of ecological principles.

The day began with an orientation led by Mrs McLucas, an ecologist specialising in coastal ecosystems. Armed with quadrats and transect tapes, the students were ready for random sampling. Working in pairs, they placed quadrats at random points along the dunes, meticulously recording plant species, their abundance, and distribution patterns. Throughout the day, students observed a variety of plants adapted to the harsh, shifting environment of the dunes, including marram grass, common vetch and sand couch. Mrs McLucas highlighted the importance of these plants in stabilizing the dunes and supporting wildlife.

By the end of the trip, students had collected substantial data to analyse back at school which they used to complete a practical report as part of their A-level course.

The visit to Umbra Nature Reserve was an invaluable educational experience, bringing the dynamic world of sand dune ecosystems to life and highlighting the importance of practical fieldwork in biological studies.

Business Studies Fortis Mini Company

At the start of the academic year, Year 13 Business Studies students came together to form a mini company to expand their knowledge of business management and day-to-day business processes.

The pupils initially applied for their roles within the business, outlining their skills and qualities in an application process which would then be analysed by their teachers. Roles within the company varied from Managing director to Finance manager, Marketing director and beyond. Once roles were assigned, the students began to meet once or twice a week to discuss product ideas, logo possibilities and generally brainstorm on how the business would operate and what its aim would be.

The decision was made that the pupils would name the company 'Fortis' meaning strength in Latin. This unique but recognisable business name is tied in with the overall aim of the company. The company was set up to open a conversation specifically within schools and with young people about their mental health, thus forming an opportunity for young people to open up about their issues. All of this was taken into consideration when othe marketing team created the company logo, with it showcasing a heart within a brain, once again outlining the aim of positive mental health.

Once company logos, aims and roles had been decided, the pupils met to make a final decision on their choice of product, with the decision being made that they would sell comfortable and innovative hoodies as a way for people to identify with the Fortis movement. These hoodies displayed the company logo on the front, along with the definition of the word Fortis on the back to make people aware of the brand and make it easily recognisable. The product was then formulated by locating suppliers for the hoodies, and local suppliers to facilitate the printing onto the hoodies. This was all initially financed by shareholders investment from pupils, teachers and SLT members within the school as well as fundraisers conducted throughout the year. These fundraisers included hot dog sales for younger pupils and sweet sales at our 'Sound of Music' school play.

Once the company's inventory arrived, the pupils set out to promote the product through their social media platforms. These were used to promote/ provide updates on the product, engage with the company's audience and raise awareness for mental health as a whole.

The pupils were not only selling to the local community, but they were also invited to various Young Enterprise fairs such as St George's Market, Belfast, in early December as well as Rushmere shopping centre, Craigavon, in early February. These experiences were massively helpful for the young people to interact with customers, enhancing their sales skills, as well as observing other small businesses to take inspiration from. The small fairs overall were a huge success, with Fortis even coming home from the Rushmere fair with the 'Best Visiting Company' award!! The young pupils can now look back on this experience very fondly, with some maybe even getting a glimpse of what they will now aspire to pursue as a future career. All of the pupils worked incredibly well together, learning immensely valuable skills such as time management, teamwork, organisation, communication, money management and so much more. These are skills which all the students will be able to use in their future careers no matter what path they choose.


Fieldwork in geography is invaluable for students, transforming theoretical knowledge into practical experience.



Home Economics

A2 level Nutrition and Food Science Resea<mark>rch Proj</mark>ects

To explore the attitudes of households towards food poverty and insecurity and their awareness of the situation

My research explored the attitudes of households towards food poverty and insecurity and their awareness of the situation. It considered the UK's current cost of living crisis and issues which have 'fed' its severity including inflation, the Covid Pandemic, unemployment, conflict and Brexit. I established a questionnaire to investigate people's knowledge of food poverty, their concerns and their perceptions of the cause of UK food poverty. I collected data anonymously from 30 participants and correlated, compared and conveyed it in a review. It exhibited facts, figures and feelings on food poverty. Results declared that the public hold the government accountable for a major part of food poverty, including reduced

access to food due to Brexit, soaring food prices due to inflation and an increased population due to their handling of refugee/asylum seekers. Participants believed lack of income and size of families were the biggest challenge, with 60% agreeing that it was not easy to escape the food poverty trap.

When conducting this assignment, I had many opportunities to gain expertise along the way. The main talent I feel I have achieved was organisation; whilst having to focus not only on a deadline but also my other A Level subjects, I had to plan and prioritise around specific deadlines. The experience of completing my research project allowed me to acquire understanding in organisation, independence and literacy skills. Furthermore, I improved my ICT skills, especially within the use of excel. This expansion of knowledge will carry through for countless years to come.

I am ecstatic, elated and excited with my research

project, as I met the deadline early. Furthermore, throughout the process and as my skills developed, I had less corrections at each step of the project; this motivated me to continue to stay patient and determined. I just hope the examiner is as satisfied and thrilled with my work, as much as I am!

On the whole, I enjoyed the task of seeing my improvements throughout each section of my project. As I completed each section, I caught sight of myself developing the new skills mentioned above. Overall, this project helped give me an insight into what I am capable of achieving when I work hard.

As challenging as the task was (completing a research project adhering to the Harvard system of referencing), I thoroughly enjoyed the process of both primary and secondary research on the topic of Food Poverty. As my project came to an end, I not only understand how fortunate I am, but it allows me to appreciate and respect the situations in which other families may find themselves.

To explore the behaviour and attitudes of families towards food waste in the UK

My study explored the behaviour and attitudes of families towards food waste in the UK and its effect on climate change; I chose this focus because existing research indicates that most food waste in the UK stems from households. I formed a questionnaire to explore the behaviour and attitudes of families towards food waste and the impact COVID-19 and the cost-of-living crisis has had regarding food waste. This was distributed amongst 30 families, for the primary food shopper to complete anonymously. These were returned inside five days. Results showed most participants wasted less than the UK average amount of food weekly, but this could be because the primary research was conducted after another year of the cost-of-living crisis. Many participants expressed a desire to reduce their food waste although lots of barriers prevented them doing this, particularly a lack of time and work commitments. Moreover, the cost-of-living crisis appears to have had a considerable impact on reducing food wastage.

I enjoyed completing this research project, particularly comparing secondary studies with my own primary research findings, as well as getting the opportunity to design my own questionnaire and getting people to complete it. Through completing this research project, I have had the opportunity to develop different skills including ICT skills through forming graphs and charts to include in my project, skills using the Harvard system of referencing throughout my project (which was new to me) and I have also developed my skills in researching secondary sources; I used these in various places throughout my coursework to compare to my own primary research, as well as to gain background knowledge on the topic of food waste.

To investigate households' attitudes and habits in relation to food security

This study investigated households' attitudes and habits in relation to food security, as pre-existing studies brought to light this major present-day issue. Therefore, I assembled a questionnaire in hope of gaining a better understanding of households' views on the security of food, and their habits emerging from this issue. They were dispersed at random amongst 30 households and the respondents returned them anonymously,

after a short period of time. I found that households were mostly unaware of food security and haven't considered the issue previously. Some believed they were food secure (but lacked knowledge on this issue), but when they were made more aware of the matter, they questioned their status of food security. It was highlighted that the participants were now enlightened that they have a part to play, with the majority eager to help/prevent the issue spiralling further out of control, which may be as a result of myself raising awareness of the habits/attitudes connected to food security.

I have gained many skills through completing this assignment including organisation skills while working on my time management in order to meet the assigned deadlines. I even used skills that are involved in the Harvard system of referencing while writing my bibliography. Throughout the study many numeracy and literacy skills were tested with ICT being a dominant factor used, along with researching secondary data sources. Overall, I have greatly enjoyed my research project as it has enabled me to gain many skills and qualities whilst growing in confidence within myself and realising what I can achieve.

To explore adolescents' attitudes and behaviours in relation to physical activity by Alex Neill

My research project investigates adolescents' attitudes and behaviours towards physical activity, as research showed that majority of teenagers are physically inactive, thus failing to meet government guidelines. The research investigated how physical activity could be promoted, as well as barriers that hold adolescents back from participating in exercise. I constructed a questionnaire to investigate adolescents' knowledge on guidelines as well as the benefits of physical activity, and to compare individual's views and behaviours.

The questionnaire was distributed amongst 30 adolescents and handed back after three days in a sealed blank envelope. Results concluded that majority of adolescents had knowledge of government guidelines and benefits of physical activity; however, most adolescents were not meeting these guidelines due to barriers such as lack of motivation and having insufficient energy due to the demands of school. Many of the adolescents expressed they would like to see physical activity promoted more and that it should be made compulsory in schools and colleges up until the age of 18.

Completing my research project, I gained many skills such as planning and organisational skills so that I could be ahead of my work and have my coursework submitted early, as well as keeping on top of my other subjects. I also had the opportunity to expand my ICT skills by using excel to make graphs and charts for my research project and completing research on my chosen study. When drafting my research project, I furthered my literacy skills as I had to ensure all my work was in the third person past tense and ensure my work was at the highest standard. I also learnt how to carry out referencing using the Harvard System and wrote a bibliography, which is a skill which will be useful to me in the future as I continue my educational studies.

I am incredibly pleased and delighted with my work as I spent a lot of my time on it and prioritised it over some other subjects. I remained determined the whole way through to complete my coursework and continue to make it better as I corrected every draft.

I also am confident as I put a lot of effort and hard work into my research project, to complete it at the highest possible level that I am capable of, and I am confident it will contribute greatly towards my final grade of A Level Nutrition & Food Science.

I found the entire process of my research project thoroughly enjoyable, as I was confident in what I was doing and also got a lot of guidance from my teacher, Mrs Halliday. I enjoyed expanding my own knowledge as I carried out my research, as well gathering in results from my questionnaire and completing my collated results as some responses were quite eye-opening. I also found the process enjoyable as I stayed on top of my work, which prevented me from being stressed about it.

To ascertain the effectiveness of Front of Pack Traffic light labelling on consumers' food choices

This study explored the effectiveness of front of pack traffic light labelling and how it facilitates consumers in buying healthy food choices. The primary research indicated that whilst 70% of household shoppers are aware of traffic light labelling, a concerning 30% were not. The author constructed a questionnaire (distributed amongst 30 household shoppers) to investigate the reasons why consumers may not look at traffic light labelling and to evaluate the effectiveness of this system.

After completion within 2 days, participants returned their questionnaires to the author in unmarked envelopes. Results showed that having children is the dominant factor affecting most household purchases, with only 30% of participants declaring that traffic light labelling helps a lot. Although 70% said that they were aware of it, only 30% said they often look at it and this is mostly because they don't have time to compare food items to the healthiest option (73.3%). Furthermore, 20% said that they would find Nutri-score and 13.3% said they would find health warning labels easier to understand.

By completing this assignment, I developed multiple skills such as time management and organisational skills to ensure that I met deadlines to hand parts in on time. I also developed planning skills when completing this assignment as I had to do a lot of research and plan when to hand out questionnaires etc. Evaluation skills were very important in this project as I had to link and evaluate my primary and secondary research together. Another skill I developed was creating, distributing and collecting a questionnaire, in addition to collating all the results. This assignment taught me how to reference and write a bibliography using the Harvard system, which was tricky at the start, but I finally caught onto it.

I am very pleased with the work I have produced and have met the deadline early. I believe that I have finished this assignment to the best of my ability and if I was to do it again, I don't think I would change anything. As every step of this assignment was different in its own way, it kept me motivated throughout.

Overall, I am more confident in what I can achieve as this project has shown me that when you work hard you can achieve what you want. During this assignment I was developing new skills everyday as I have explained above, and this has also made me more confident.

I found collating the results of my questionnaire was the most enjoyable aspect, as it was very interesting to conduct my own primary research and it was intriguing and challenging to compare it to my secondary research, reflecting in some cases on plausible reasons for any difference in results. I also found the research part enjoyable, as it allowed me to extend my background knowledge about traffic light labelling and find out new information.

Senior UKMT Maths Challenge

The real story of Maria and the von Trapps

It seems everybody has seen the film The Sound of Music at least twice – even if they don't care to admit to it! Before it became the highest-grossing film in the history of the cinema, The Sound of Music was, despite reviews, a most successful stage musical, chalking up OM a four-year run on Broadway, and an even longer run in the West End where it set new records. And before that, it was, of course, a true story.



The Sound of Music is remarkably faithful to actual events, and of its principal dramatis personae only the roles of 'Uncle' Max and Rolf are fictitious. Maria Kutschera (her mother's maiden name was Rainer) was born on a train in the Tyrolean alps in 1905. Two years later, her mother died of pneumonia and by the age of nine Maria was an orphan – compounding an already unsettled childhood. By her early teens she had developed into a headstrong, hearty tomboy, and at the earliest opportunity she left the Tyrol for Vienna where she studied at the State Teachers' College. It was in Vienna that Maria discovered the two forces that shaped her character and changed her life irrevocably – music and God.

As soon as she had completed her training at the age of eighteen, Maria joined the strictest order of Benedictine nuns she was able to find – the ancient Nonnburg Abbey in Salzburg. Despite distinguishing herself as a fine teacher of the convent children, Maria was something of a wayward postulant, prone to whistling in the cloisters and praying in the mountains rather than the abbey. The Reverend Mother Abbess felt that Maria needed a little more 'life experience' before becoming a nun and so, in response to an earlier enquiry, sent her on a temporary assignment as a governess (the twenty-sixth in only four years!) to one of the children of the widowed Baron von Trapp.

Georg von Trapp served in the navy and, while a Captain, met and married a beautiful young heiress, , Agatha. The couple had seven children and



live in some splendour in Pola on the Adriatic coast in the final days of the Hapsburg Empire. During the First World War, the Captain's bravery earned him many decorations and a title, but in 1918, Austria was defeated and the Imperial navy was decommissioned. Having lost his vocation, three years later he would lose his wife to an epidemic of scarlet fever. The Captain left Pola immediately and took his children to a vast estate at Aigen on the outskirts of Salzburg. It was here, in October 1925, that Maria arrived and was introduced to the Captain's seven sailor-suited children. The eldest was a boy, Rupert, then Agathe, Maria, another boy Werner, Hedwig, Johanna and Martina. The Captain was an aloof father and the children, while not unloved, were certainly unhappy.



Given her own neglected upbringing, Maria took to the motherless children instantly and they to her – especially as she encouraged them to play in the grounds and introduced them to the joys of singing and music-making. One evening the Captain, upon returning from Vienna where he had developed an attachment to an Austrian Princess, was so overcome by the sound of his children singing that he dusted off his violin and accompanied them. The sound of music did therefore bring him closer to his children once more, and to their governess. Eventually, in 1927, Maria and Georg married in Nonnberg Abbey - not before Georg had untangled himself from an awkward situation with Princess Yvonne in Vienna.

In 1938, the Nazi occupation of Austria (the Anschluss) shattered the Von Trapps' harmony. Returning from a trip to Munich, where, curiously Georg and Maria had sat in a restaurant at a table adjacent to Hitler's, the Captain and his eldest son were confronted with telegrams offering them new positions away from Salzburg - in the navy, and their health service respectively. Unwilling to collaborate with the new authorities, the cabled their refusals. Shortly afterwards, a third telegram arrived 'inviting' the family to perform at Hitler's official birthday celebrations. There was no response to this telegram. As Georg wisely demurred one did not say 'No' to Hitler three times. Within twenty-four hours they had fled their home and their homeland. They did not hike over the mountains to Switzerland (some one-hundred-and-fifty miles west of Salzburg!), but instead drove the much shorter distance southwards to Italy. Whilst there were no Nazis in hot pursuit, their escape was nevertheless knife-edged, for the following day the borders were closed.

Once in Italy, the sailed to London, and then, in September 1938, they arrived in New York where they began their first American tour.

When war was declared in Europe, the family were imprisoned by the US authorities for a short time on suspicion of being undesirables. By now the von Trapps were no strangers to adversity or sacrifice, and from this low point they went on to become one of the most successful choirs in the United States – where they toured exhaustively – and abroad.

Georg died in 1947 of heart complications. The family continued to tour and, in 1950, made and emotion, but brief, return to Salzburg – although they did not visit their precious villa. During the war, Hienrich Himmler, the architect of the Jewish holocaust, used the house for a time as his headquarters, entertaining Hitler there on numerous occasions.

Baroness Maria von Trapp died in 1987. Most of her children and stepchildren are still living.

The Sound of Music Review

Music by Richard Rodgers / Lyrics by Oscar Hammerstein II / Book by Howard Lindsay and Russell Crouse

In October 2023, over 70 pupils from Cookstown High School staged Rodger and Hammerstein's classic musical 'The Sound of Music'.







Cookstown High School has long since held a reputation for performing classic musicals and after six years it was fantastic to revive the tradition.

The tuneful, heart-warming story is based on the real-life story of the Von Trapp Family singers, one of the world's best-known concert groups in the era immediately preceding World War II.

Over the past few months students and staff had been busy rehearsing. Every spare moment during school and in the evenings, lines were being learned, music being played, and costumes being fitted. As the show grew closer, so did the excitement which had been building for the final few months.

Over the course of three nights students performed to a sold-out Millar Hall.



The atmosphere was fantastic, and friends and family members took their seats. It was also great to see some former students coming along to support the school. Some even shared their memories of taking part in previous shows when they were pupils! When the lights dimmed, and

the band started playing, the audience were immediately transported to Austria.

First up was the Girls' choir, angelically singing like the 'Morning Hymn' at Nonnberg Abbey. We then moved to the mountainside where Emma



Caskey sung the iconic number 'The Sound of Music' – memories of Julie Andrew's singing the song from a mountaintop in Vienna came flooding back. One of the most-famous scenes, where the Captain announces his children using a whistle, drew laughter from the audience.

Act One finished with Sarah Fulton blowing the roof off the auditorium with her belting rendition of "Climb Every Mountain" – a song only dared sung by the brave.

Tea was served during the interval and some audience members were heard talking about watching the Oscar winning film every Christmas holiday. Others had the songs 'Do, Re, Me' and 'My Favourite Things' stuck in their head.



The audience were buzzing and some even joined in singing 'The Sound of Music' for the finale! Many students had never performed on stage in their lives, and it was incredible to see students'

confidence and talents in both acting and singing come to light.

Emma Caskey, who played Maria, remarked: "Playing Maria has been a brilliant experience. I have loved every second since we started rehearsals in January. I love singing and it was fantastic being on stage with everyone!"



Captain Von Trapp, played by year 14 pupil, Timothy Clarke said: "It was exciting to be part of such an iconic show. 



Mr Mark Stuart began the work in Jan 2023 and we quickly saw results from their collective labour, with beautifully crafted planter boxes, providing a riot of colour in spring 2024. HE initiated fruitful community connections with MUVE, bringing practical skills to life for pupils as well as Kildress Rectory Lodge Fishery, where pupils gained entry qualification in fly fishing (and a valuable lesson in patience and quiet!).

We were absolutely gutted when the time came for Mr Stuart to head off to Co Galway (the perks of being the rector's husband!) to pursue new challenges. The quandary for CHS was how would we keep the progression and continuity for the pupils on the Future Ready Programme?

It was with delight (and relief in equal measure!) when Mr Jason Martin, ably assisted by Mr Ivor Faulkner, expressed their interest in taking up the mantle. Jason has a passion for empowering young people, through whatever vehicle possible, to engage in their education and embrace the opportunities and skills they have at their fingertips.

Soon Jason started with a programme of car maintenance for the KS4 pupils, in a bid to

better prepare them for a lifetime of safe motoring. Also, in an effort to ensure safer drivers of the future, they began with a car handling showcase in the form of an Autotest demonstration. These pupils also had some basic car maintenance demonstration work. The KS₃ pupils embraced the challenge of environmental sensitivity and had a presentation on protecting the natural habitat of bats, culminating in making bat boxes, in association with the volunteers in MUVE.

Since Easter, pupils have been reflecting on what their purpose is, in terms of harnessing their individual skill, being an active participant in school and the local or wider community. They have engaged in 'hands on learning' and been asked to consider how this would tie in with their school studies. They have focused on mastering the basics, even able to iron a shirt, sew on a button and polish their shoes. If we don't encourage our youngsters to take pride in themselves, there's little hope they will be able to replicate pride and loyalty to their local area. We are very excited to see how the new year progresses.

We have plans to operate an August activity programme, including getting children to be "school ready" for September, whilst enjoying some team building and active learning.

We are very pleased to offer this pastoral support in Cookstown HS and hope this will ensure our pupils have the transferable skills for the future.

the sunrise on the way there. It was strange seeing the sun rise so late in the morning. Afterwards we went to see the Great Geysir and got to see it spewing boiling water high up into the air. The Gulfoss waterfall was next on our agenda it was so mesmerizing seeing the waterfall break through the ice at such speeds. Next we visited Pingvellir National Park. The park lies in a rift valley or the Mid-Atlantic Ridge and the boundary between the North American and Eurasian tectonic plates. To its south lies Þingvallavatn, the largest natural lake in Iceland. It was amazing to touch the wall of the North American Plate and also see how this area is pulling in two different directions. On our way back to our hotel we stopped of and saw some Icelandic horses which we got to pet and feed. Finally we made it back to the hotel for some much needed rest but as if we didn't see enough we managed to capture the northern lights along the sea front of Reykjavik. During the day we had the most perfect weather, that even our tour guides were taking photos of the scenery.

On the third day we departed for our sight seeing round Reykjavik. Firstly we visited Hallgrimskirkja cathedral which gave us the most amazing view over all of the city. We then went down by the lake which was frozen over and also had a snowman building competition. We also had free time to explore the City Centre and of course shop. In the evening we then headed to Laugardalslaug geothermal swimming pool, this complex had a large pool with slides, Jacuzzi's, steam room and sauna. It was a great way to spend time with friends after a very busy day exploring.

On the final full day our tour guides Anna and Thor picked us up again and took us to Skogafoss Waterfall and then the famous Reynishverfi (black beach). The Black Beach was spectacular with powerful waves and the classic eroded headland. Then we travelled to Seljalandsfoss Waterfall, we weren't able to climb to the top of the waterfall as the steps were too icy. Lastly we got to see Myrdalsjokull Glacier which is 30 miles long and 20 miles wide and is even still currently moving. It was amazing to see the blue

colour of the ice at the snout of the glacier. This was such an unforgettable experience. My favourite part had to be the blue lagoon by far as it was such an great experience.

My Experience as a National **Youth Standard Beare**



From a young age of 13 years old I had been training to become a standard bearer for the Royal British Legion. My training sessions would take place locally in the Cookstown Royal British Legion branch, within these training session I was taught how to perform the drill movements, how to march and how to act within competitions or events.

Youth standard bearer competition

On the 9th of April I flew to Stockport, England to compete against 4 other individuals for the title of 'National Youth Standard Bearer'. This competition consisted of me being scored out of ten on twelve different movements and being scored out of ten on three different sections of my uniform, the total amount in which I could have scored out of was 150. The final result was close between me and the runner up.

The Queens Funeral

Due to me winning this competition I was made aware that if Queen Elizabeth II was to pass away within the year of me being the national youth standard bearer I would be given the honour and privilege of being a part of the funeral procession. On the 7th of September it had been confirmed that Queen Elizabeth II had passed away. This came to me as a massive shock, it felt

physically impossible that I would be a part of the funeral at all. The initial email was called 'RBL OPERATION LONDON BRIDGE' and it stated I was not allowed to tell anyone about the funeral.

The day had come when I would be flying out to London, it still did not feel real at all. This was an exciting yet nerve wrecking experience as I knew any mistake or facial expression made would be documented live and broadcasted to every country in the world. There were 100 of us in total participating in this funeral precession, as soon as we all got to the hotel we were briefed by the National Parade Marshall on what we would have to do, where we would be placed and our itinerary for the week. We were then told that we had to do overnight rehearsals. I did not expect it to be as intense as what it was... I was waiting from roughly 9 o'clock at night to 3 o'clock in the morning in the MOD building waiting until we had to march out. Once I was out, we were standing in the one place for numerous hours rehearsing every in and out of how the funeral would go. This included watching all the horses, the Army, Navy and each band walk past as if it were the real thing. It even included a mimic coffin as if it was real. I was exhausted after such a long and cold night but it gave me much more anticipation till the real

thing occurred. The day had finally came and I was a bundle of nerves, although it made me so immensely proud to be there representing the Royal British Legion. It felt like it had happened so fast but every minute was more and more special. It became real as the Royal family marched in front of me and I was standing in front of the Navy sailors who transported the coffin. The Queen's funeral was definitely a moment which I will never forget.

Festival of remembrance

On the 10th of November 2022 I was flying back to London to be apart of the Festival Remembrance in the Albert hall. This is a Celebration of Service which reflects the nations admiration of the Armed Forces. This gave me an opportuni-





ty to show my respect and honour to the Armed Forces too. This opportunity required training and rehearsals as the programme would be broadcast live on television. This made me further excited as this was my goal when I initially started as a standard bearer, to make it the Albert Hall. I was also able to witness the soon to be King Charles III standing in the royal box observing the whole show.

The Kings coronation

On the 2nd of May I flew out to London to partake in the King's Coronation, this was a difficult time due to me being ready to sit my A levels and I had to understand that I would miss out on things such as Sixth Form leavers day. As much as I wanted to be involved in these activities I knew my opportunity was too good to pass up, so I accepted immediately. Again there was limited numbers of people invited and we were briefed on how there would be another overnight rehearsal. This time around the rehearsal seemed more intense due to the cold weather and levels of tiredness I was feeling as I had rehearsals the same day I landed. I was able to see the Royal gold carriage and the carriages which William and Kate would be in on the day.

Over the course of the couple of days we had rehearsals in the hotel, practising drill and we even practiced marching around Hyde Park to ensure it was up to a high standard. The 6th of May had come around and we got a bus to where we would march off from Horse Guards. When we had got to Horse Guards the streets were packed and excitement had filled the group. We were given orders to line up and get ready to march to Westminister Abbey where King Charles would have his coronation. When we had got there it was only a short time until the parade started. As it neared we did a royal dip for the king. He had a good gaze on every single one of us as he had passed. When he had went in to Westminster Abbey we were provided with a short break until

he was ready to leave. This meant we had to march back to Horse Guards. It was only a short while until we had made our way back up to Westminster Abbey and Charles had been made the official King. As I had participated in the coronation I will be presented a King Charles III Coronation Medal. It was unbelievable to see the Royal family go past in the Gold State Coach, this was yet again another moment I will definitely not forget.

Mid Ulster Civic award

Additionally I was privileged to be put forward to receive an award from the Mid Ulster Council. I was being recognised for my efforts within the Royal British Legion by all. It was an amazing experience to be acknowledged for my hobbies which gave me the opportunity to be apart of so many important milestones in history.

My overall experience through the Royal British Legion has been amazing and I have been provided with amazing opportunities and memories which I will treasure forever. I would like to give a special thank you to my uncle Norman Espie who has been training me alongside Susan Parke. Without them I would not have done so many unforgettable things. Cookstown High School has been amazing in supporting me on my journey. The teachers have been so understand-

ing if I had to take a couple of days off school or if I have had to miss a tracking test to complete events for the RBL.

In April 2024 we were visited by students from Espoonlahti Upper Secondary School


Hello Cookstown High! Today I'll be telling you about our wonderful visit and our experience at Cookstown High.


